MORE ABOUT THE SHOW:

Elle Woods, an upbeat and fashionable senior, is heartbroken when her boyfriend, Warner Huntington III, breaks up with her. Warner, aiming to attend Harvard Law School and pursue a political career, believes Elle does not fit the "serious" partner image he desires. Undeterred, Elle decides to prove him wrong by studying for the LSAT, submitting an eyecatching application, and earning admission to Harvard.

At Harvard, Elle struggles to fit in amongst the goal-driven students and often faces humiliation during her classes. She also learns that Warner is now engaged to Vivian Kensington, another law student. Motivated by the rivalry, Elle redirects her energy toward academic success, with help and encouragement from her kind classmate, Emmett Richmond. Her creativity and unorthodox thinking begin to win over her peers and professors alike.

Elle's determination earns her a spot on Professor Callahan's legal team for a major murder trial. IMPORTANT NOTE ON CONTENT THEMES:

Please be aware that this production contains themes and references which may not be suitable for younger students. We encourage you to review these points carefully before deciding if the show is appropriate for your school group.

INCLUDED THEMES AND DIALOGUE:

- Language Usage: The production features phrases such as "shaking your junk," "red hot booty," and "ass."
- **Teacher-Student Relationship**: The depiction of a professor attempting an inappropriate romantic advance towards a student.
- **Costume Context:** Features a scene where a character appears in a bunny costume as part of a fancy-dress party mishap. There will be a prop of thong underwear which is used as evidence.
- **Song Themes:** "Bend and Snap" is a lighthearted yet suggestive number centred around females attracting male attention.
- **Court Scene Dialogue:** Includes discussions of a "sperm law case" with phrases such as "sexual encounter", "masturbatory emissions" and "reckless abandonment" used in the case summation.
- Character Representation: Humorous depictions of cultural stereotypes, including same-sex couples. "Is he gay or is he European" is used during a song in the courtroom scene.
